TERM 2 INQUIRY - ROOM 10

During Term 2, our inquiry focus was Earthquakes. The children came up with their own research topic and then formed groups with those who were interested in exploring similar topics. These were

Group 1: How can we care for and support people who are hurt or affected by earthquakes in New Zealand and around the world?

<u>Group 2</u>: How do earthquakes change people's lives and the places they live, both in New Zealand and other countries?

Group 3: How do earthquakes of different sizes affect buildings, and how can we build safer ones to be better prepared?

Group 4: What can we do at school and home to stay safe and be ready for a big earthquake?

<u>Group 5</u>: What are tectonic plates, and how do they cause earthquakes when they move or collide?

Working in groups helped the students understand their topic better and also taught them skills like teamwork, sharing ideas, and doing research. All the students collaborated well and were able to confidently share their findings. I was so impressed that we invited the other classes from the Rangitumau syndicate to come and view their work.


















